Palm Sunday is the sixth and last Sunday of Lent and the beginning of Holy Week. Holy Week is the week before Easter, commemorating events in the last days of Christ's life. It begins on Palm Sunday and ends on Easter Monday. Holy Week is the last week of Lent.

Palm Sunday is a time of celebration as well as sadness because Jesus died on a cross less than a week after he had entered Jerusalem.

What is Palm Sunday?

The Sunday before Easter is known as Palm Sunday. It marks the end of Lent and celebrates Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem for the Jewish festival of Passover. Great crows of people lined the streets waving palm branches to welcome him. The people were very excited. They spread branches on the road - and even laid down their clothes. They shouted "Hosanna!" which means "Save us now!"

Why is it called Palm Sunday?

The Sunday before Easter is called Palm Sunday because the crowds waved palm branches as they followed Jesus' procession into Jerusalem.

Why did Jesus go to Jerusalem?

It was the time of the Jewish feast of Passover. Many Jews travelled to Jerusalem to celebrate this feast together. Traditionally, many churches will have a procession in or around the church while people sing songs of praise and wave palm leaves. This is to help them imagine what Jesus' entry into Jerusalem might have been like.

The Second Collection this weekend is for Julia's Fund. This fund has existed for over seven years. It is named 'Julia's Fund' in memory of a baby girl who died as a result of a cot death. Julia's parents did not have the funds to transport their baby's remains to Poland; parishioners rallied around and collected the funds. The appeal touched many hearts and was soon over subscribed, we decided to keep the fund going to help parishioners in need—last year we helped parishioners who needed help to pay bills, and provided small loans. Those who need help contact Fr. Jim in complete confidence, checks are normally made to ensure the claim is genuine

and then the case is presented to the committee members who consist of Deacon Dennis, the Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council and the Head Teacher of Saint Norbert's School. Voluntary collections are taken during Advent and Lent each year, and a second collection is taken on the fourth Sunday of Advent and [today] Palm Sunday. The collection taken on Palm Sunday, together with donations received throughout Lent, are presented during the Mass of The Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday as our 'Gifts for the Poor'.

Confessions: Fr. Jim will be available for Confessions after both morning Masses today and after Stations of the Cross this afternoon; please see this week's schedule for other times.

Holy Communion and Confessions for the sick and the housebound: Deacon Dennis will be accompanying Fr. Jim on visits, Fr. Jim will be happy to hear Confessions during these visits; obviously, Deacon Dennis will not be present whilst Confessions are being heard.

STUDENT CROSS: We look forward to welcoming students who are on a walking pilgrimage to Walsingham—their aim is to reach Walsingham on Good Friday to participate in the afternoon liturgy and Easter Vigil. This year there will also be a film crew from Liverpool who are taking part in a similar pilgrimage which they are filming as they go along. Both pilgrimages should be arriving in our hall at approximately 5.00pm for an evening meal, they will be staying overnight in the Methodist Church—if you are free, please come and welcome them.

Tuesday: Owing to hospital appointments, Mass will be celebrated at 1.00pm today.

Also **Tuesday: Polish Reconciliation Service** will be taking place at 6.30pm. Although the actual service will be in Polish, Fr. Stan and Fr. Daniel can hear Confessions in English; they will be joined by a third priest.

Wednesday: We have the last of our early morning Masses at 6.30am. Fr. Jim and Deacon Dennis will then participate in the Chrism Mass in St. Barnabas Cathedral, Nottingham.

Keeping our churches open during Holy Week and Easter: Bishop Patrick asks us to consider: If your church is normally locked during the day between services, why not consider during Holy Week and the Easter season keeping the church open during the day, so that passers -by can drop in and find a quite space just to be still before Christ in the Blessed Sacrament or to pause for a while amidst the busyness of their day? Is this something we could do? Fr. Jim is suggesting we could give this a try this Wednesday—if we can get enough volunteers, we could have adoration of the Blessed Sacrament all day—we would require at least two people to stay in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament; please sign the list if you are able to join the rota—if there are insufficient volunteers, we will leave the church open, but the Blessed Sacrament will not be exposed.

On Holy Thursday morning (in some dioceses, including our own Diocese of Nottingham, it may be another morning during Holy Week), the bishop, joined by the priests and deacons of the diocese, gather at the cathedral to celebrate the Chrism Mass. This Mass manifests the unity of the priests with their bishop, and the priests renew the promises they made at their priestly ordination in the presence of the bishop.

During the Mass the bishop blesses three oils — the oil of catechumens (*oleum catechumenorum* or *oleum sanctorum*), the oil of the infirm (*oleum infirmorum*) and holy chrism (*sacrum chrisma*) — which will be used in the administration of the sacraments throughout the diocese for the year.

As our bishop blesses these three oils at the Chrism Mass this year, our hearts turn to our gracious Lord who bestows His infinite love and mercy to us through these sacraments. Let us also pray for Bishop Patrick, our priests: Fr. Jim, Fr. Stan, Fr. Daniel and the priests of the diocese who are the ministers of the sacraments in the parish and throughout our diocese, that they may be the humble and generous

Our Chrism Mass takes place at 11.30am on Wednesday at Saint Barnabas Cathedral, Derby Road, Nottingham, NG1 5AE—all are welcome. There will not be an evening Mass in the parish on Wednesday—but, if we can get enough volunteers, we hope to have exposition of the Blessed Sacrament throughout the day. Fr. Jim will be available for Confessions at 7.00pm—if no one is present, the church will be closed.

Holy Thursday: No morning Mass today. Fr. Jim will be available for Confessions this morning from 9.00am until 10.00am.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper will take place at 7.30pm. This Mass will be in English and Polish and will be concelebrated by Fr. Jim and Fr. Stan. The Holy Oils that were consecrated during the Chrism Mass, will be presented during this Mass together with our 'Gifts for the Poor' which we donate to 'Julia's Fund'.

The church will remain open until midnight—watching before the Blessed Sacrament.

The liturgy of Holy Thursday is called **the Mass of the Lord's Supper**, a commemoration of Jesus' last supper before his arrest and crucifixion. As part of their Jewish heritage, Jesus and his Apostles gathered to celebrate Passover—an annual remembrance of how God saved the Israelites from slavery in Egypt centuries before. Passover, as it was celebrated in Jesus' time and still is today, occurs around a meal. Food is a predominant feature in this celebration, especially unleavened bread and wine. It was at this Passover meal that Jesus changed the prescribed rite by taking the bread and wine, saying, "This is my body; this is my blood. Do this in remembrance of me," thus, giving himself to us in the Eucharist. Not just this Mass, but every Mass Catholics celebrate is a living remembrance and embodiment of Jesus' Real Presence in the bread and wine made holy by the power of the Holy Spirit. This, for Catholics, is the most sacred gift of all—that Jesus is truly present with us in the form of bread and wine. As

Catholics, not only do we celebrate this awesome, miraculous gift, but, as we partake of the Bread and Wine, we actually become what we believe: the Body of Christ blessed, broken and shared for the life of the world.

Good Friday: We are requested to observe a day of fast today and abstain from all meat products.

Fr. Jim will be joining the children at 10.00am for 'The Way of the Cross'.—Hot Cross buns and a drink will be served in the Hall after the service.

Fr. Stan will take part in the Walk of Witness starting from the Methodist Church 'next door' also starting at 10.00am.

Deacon Dennis will take part in the Walk of Witness which sets off from Crowland Abbey at 11.00am.

3.00pm: The Solemn Proclamation of the Passion. We will be requiring some volunteer readers to take part in the Passion reading.

Fr. Jim will be available for Confessions after the Children's Way of the Cross and the afternoon liturgy.

7.00pm: Polish Service, followed by watching before the Blessed Sacrament until midnight.

Mass is never celebrated on Good Friday as we commemorate the passion and death of our Lord. Holy Communion is distributed during the afternoon service and is given as 'viaticum' to the dying.

On **Holy Saturday** the Church throughout the world is in mourning. Mass is never celebrated.

Fr. Stan will preside over the Polish tradition of the blessing of the Easter Food—this will take place in church today at 10.00am/11.00am/12.00pm & 1.00pm.

The Easter Vigil begins at 8.00pm—beginning with the blessing of light and culminating in the first Mass of Easter—this is the most joyful night in the Church calendar, which you are encouraged to attend and participate. This Mass will be celebrated in English and Polish, and we are delighted that Fr. Stan will concelebrate with Fr. Jim.

Easter Sunday: Masses are at the usual times (8.00am & 11.00am) there will also be a Polish Mass at 1.00pm.

The collection taken at the English Masses over Easter is your personal gift to Fr. Jim.

The Parish Office will be closed on Good Friday and re-open on Easter Tuesday (18th April).

Fr, Jim will be taking a break after Easter—but has to attend the Johnson Hospital during this time, on the days he has a hospital appointment, he will say Mass, but please check the times.
